VIOLATION OF SUNDAY LAW CAUSED LINEMEN'S ARREST

Schenectady Railway Co's Workmen Forced to Stop Work.

REAL CAUSE OF COMPLAINT.

J. S. Woolley Objected. To Multiplicity Of Wires Before Home—Hearing On Tuesday. Three linemen of the Schenectady Railway Company were arrested on Sunday morning on complaint of J. S. Woolley for violation of the Sunday law. The men were engaged in changing a converter and wires of the light company at the corner of Milton avenue and Washington street, opposite Mr. Woolley's business place and residence. They were arraigned before Justice Whalen, and the hearing was set down for Tuesday morning, President S. C. Medbery going on their bail. Sunday labor had little to do with the arrest. The trouble is over the attempt of the Schenectady Railway Company to place a large converter and a multiplicity of wires on a pole which comes directly in front of Mr. Woolley's balcony. Mr. Woolley claims the company agreed when he gave permission to go by his premises that no other wires should go on the pole except their own, and the effort to do so is in violation of this agreement. On Saturday the workmen appeared and began on the job. He forbade them to do the work and they quit. Sunday morning, however, they came bright and early to make the change, and the only remedy Mr. Woolley had was to cause the arrest of the men. The dispute as to the placing of the converter and wires on the pole at Woolley's corner, culminated last night in the men appearing about 12:30 and going to work. This morning the converter was in place and all the wires changed.
