

DAR Names 'Good Citizen,' Elects Officers for Year

Schuylerville, Mansion Discussed by Historian

Historic facts about Schuylerville and the Schuyler Mansion, given by Miss Dorothy Webster, presentation of a "Good Citizenship" pin and certificate to Miss Elizabeth Rogers, a Saratoga High school student and election of officers featured the meeting of Saratoga Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, last night with Mrs. Peter A. Vasilief as hostess at her home, 148 Regent.

Miss Webster, who is historian of the Town of Saratoga and conducts guided tours through the Schuyler Mansion at Schuylerville, pictured that historic place as it was in post-Revolutionary times.

"Schuylerville itself," she said, "was for the most part densely wooded and full of wild animals as late as 1860. The main street was an open country road."

The earthworks of General Burgoyne were visible as late as 1860 and some of Fish Creek was the old Dutch church, she told the group. The blacksmith shop was almost on the site of the famous "surrender" tree, and where the Elementary School is today was the log house. The Marshall house, now the home of Mr. and Mrs. T. Kenneth Bullard, was mentioned as one of the famous homes of the time still standing and in use.

The stage route from Boston to the Springs, as Saratoga Springs was then called, went past the dwelling house opposite the elementary school, now the home of Vibert Osterlender. Other landmarks of Schuylerville were noted.

A major part of her highly informative and interesting talk was a history of the Schuyler Mansion, from the first building erected in 1720 and burned in the Indian Massacre of 1765, when it was owned by Johannes Schuyler, the grandfather of Philip Schuyler, to the present mansion.

"General Philip Schuyler built a more pretentious mansion than the present one and used it as his Summer home for 10 years," she explained. "This was burned in October, 1777 by Burgoyne's troops at the Battle of Saratoga." A portion of the house was rebuilt in 1778, according to letters which Miss Webster read, written by General Schuyler.

Miss Webster's extensive research disclosed many interesting facts about this celebrated house, which is now open from Summer until late Autumn.

Occupied by Philip Schuyler until 1857 when it was sacrificed in the panic of that year, the mansion was purchased in 1859 by Colonel George Strover and remained in that family until its acquisition by the National Park Service.

Mrs. Walter R. Moore Jr., president regent, expressed appreciation to Miss Webster for a fine historical survey.

The regent congratulated Miss Rogers, winner of the essay contest, sponsored under the Good Citizenship program of the DAR, and introduced her to read her essay, "Faith of Our Fathers."

"That Faith," she said, "is the basis of our education, is evident in freedom of worship, and is a faith that is living still and will be alive for many years to come."

Mrs. J. Blaine Towne, chairman of the Good Citizenship committee, presented Miss Rogers with a pin and certificate of good citizenship, for her outstanding record of deportability, leadership, service and patriotism. Mrs. Towne quoted from the State Chairman's message to these "Good Citizens": "Miss Rogers is the daughter of Mrs. Frieda Rogers."
