Study Club Hears Address On Colonial, Modern Cellars

Schuylerville—Mrs. Louis Pollett talked on Cellars at the Study Club meeting held Tuesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Joseph R. Glass, with Mrs. Grace Curtis acting as hostess.

The present day cellars which are more like living rooms, furnished in better pine and used for play and game rooms, or as a study, are quite a contrast to the cellars of colonial times.

Mrs. Pollett said, "In those days huge storehouses of food were kept for winter—barrels of fruit and vegetables, corn, beef and salt pork, homemade bread, molasses, and other provisions, which had been made by the housewife."

Cellars were used in cooking and baking and had huge pipes and ducts over them. Mrs. Pollett said. She mentioned many things as well as historical cellars, such as the cellar in the house at Boston, the present home of T. K. Bullard, where Madame Redick and her children hid during one of the forest canning days in the Revolutionary war.

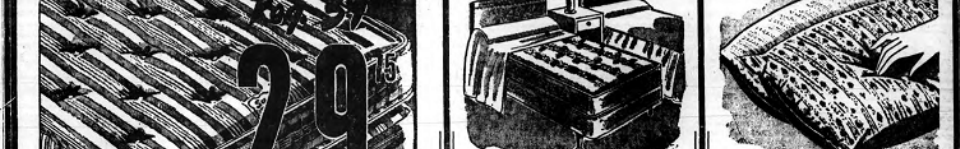
