"AFFINITIES" AT \$6 PER  
CAN'T BE UNLAWFUL

At Least Miss Grey, of "Search Light Club," Can't See It.

**UNCLE SAM IS HEARTLESS.**  
Stops the Chicago "Uniting" Bureau Which Was Doing a Land Office Business.

Chicago, Sept. 17.—If you go into the "affinity" flouting business do not undertake to collect your fees in advance. This is the advice that probably will be given by Miss Marion Grey, brunette, twenty-two years of age, who was arrested at Elgin, Ill., today she is in the custody of a deputy United States Marshal in Chicago.

Under the name of the "Search Light Club," Miss Grey and her staff of stenographers at Elgin, went to find "affinities" at \$5 each, and it is claimed they were doing a land office business when the federal authorities, who do not understand, stopped it.

Postal Inspector Henry Denney is the complainant against Miss Grey, while Miss Minnie Coleman of Milwaukee is named as the principal witness. Miss Coleman, it is alleged, contracted for the delivery of her "hearts own" to her wife at her home in Chicago.

"Everyone has an affinity here," said the will of higher power and I undertake to find him (or her) for them. I cannot understand how there is anything "illegitimate" in that," declared Miss Grey.

She took her arrest as a joke. Miss Grey went to Elgin from Detroit last week to find "affinities" under the name of the "Search Light Club." She started out a large correspondence and for several months past her incoming mail has been increasing constantly.

**"DAY OF ATONEMENT" BEGINS AT SUNSET.**  
Jewish Holy Day Observed Tomorrow by Passing—Down Penitential Procession.

The Jewish holy day known as the Day of Atonement will begin at sunset tonight. It is the most important of all the Jewish holidays, and is also called the Sabbath of Sabbath. While the observance of the penitential season, which began ten days earlier, comes to an end, and those who have kept their peace with God and with themselves enter upon the new year reintergrated. The Jews who observe the day strictly abstain from food and drink for twenty-four hours. In preparation for this ordeal it is the custom to have a fast precede the fast.

The religious exercises are continuous on the next day, and last until sunset, and at all that time no member of the congregation who is more than thirteen years old breaks the fast which began the night before. At the close of the day's devotion is the memorial service. This takes place at the end of the day. Yom Kippur, as the day is known in Hebrew, attracts even more attendants than the New Year celebration.

**GOT BOOKMAKER'S ROLL.**  
New York, Sept. 17.—Frank O'Farrell, bookmaker, has been arrested by the West, caused the arrest today of two bandwagons, filled with women of Jersey City, on the charge of relieving him of a roll of \$100.

**NEXT DEM. NOMINATION WILL BE ANYBODY'S PRIZE**  
No "Logical Candidate" Declares Minnesota's Governor.  
DAYS OF BOGISM ARE OVER.  
But Johnson Refuses to Talk Politics Other Than in the Most General Way.

New York, Sept. 15.—There is no "logical candidate" for the next Democratic nomination for the Presidency, Democracy, as I understand it, cannot consider any such proposition. His prediction is that when the party holds its annual meeting next June it will be anybody's prize and is saying that I want you to understand that I have no personal axe to grind or ambition to satisfy. I am Governor of the best state in the union and I am proud to do my work there and satisfy the people among whom I have lived for very many years.

It was Governor J. J. Johnson, of Minnesota, talking. He dropped into New York last night to spend a few days in the city. He is engaged in business with pleasure. And he declared that he did not intend to talk politics. And he did not. "I am not interested in general terms some of the leading propositions that are interesting Democrats as a whole throughout the country, but when asked to openly state his preferences or the preferences of his state organization to be candidates in the coming year, he said with a remark that was too hot to talk politics.

The Governor of Minnesota is a big man. New York Democrats have considered him Presidential timber, but he himself seems doubtful of doing this year. He is in the city, when asked if it were true that the managers of the boom for Governor Johnson, Chairman, Lieutenant Governor of New York, had been in the city to see him in their ranks, he simply smiled and fell back on the old excuse that it was too hot to talk politics. However, it can be asserted as a fact that certain of Governor Johnson's friends will see the Governor before he leaves town and will have him declare for his own state leaders to declare for the New Yorker.

During the question of the next Democratic convention, Governor Johnson took pains to improve on his previous belief that for the first time since William Jennings Bryan was nominated at Chicago in 1896, the next Democratic national convention will be a delegate-ridden assembly. The day of the absolute boss in Democratic politics, he declared, is past and no man will be able to force any particular candidate on the delegates. He said that he would not say so in words. It was plain that the Governor does not expect the popularity of the 1904 convention where B. P. Butler was favored on an unopposed convention by Eastern manipulation.

The next Democratic national platform, the Governor declared, will be a document that will be the result of the people against the trust. The platform will be a platform of pure action. So will the tariff. That, if elected, the platform is not an empty document.
