TRUSTEES KILL PLAN FOR

CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUNDS

Have No Authority to Approropriate Funds, They Say.

Assessment on the Hudson Valley Railway Company Reduced from \$40,000 to \$27,200.

Saratoga will have no public children's park and playground this season, at least, as far as the local board of trustees is concerned. In addition to adopting the annual budget and taking the village tax roll for the current year, the village fathers, at the evening regular meeting held last evening, came to the conclusion that they had no authority to raise money for such a purpose.

Accordingly on motion of Trustee Baker, the clerk was instructed to notify the secretary of the Business Men's Association of this decision. The Business Men at the last regular meeting recommended that the Board of Trustees appropriate a sum sufficient for the maintenance of a children's park for this season, and suggested that the old Cleveland Hotel site on Broadway. This recommendation was read at the meeting last evening. The meeting was called principally to hear grievances on the tax roll. There was but one grievance. This was presented by J. E. Sawyer, representing the Hudson Valley Railway Company, who objected to the assessment of \$40,000 on the company's special franchise. Mr. Sawyer subsequently presented an order made by Supreme Court Justice Pitts in which the justice gave an opinion as to the proper assessment for the town and village. Upon the advice of Village Attorney Clark, and by the unanimous vote of the trustees the assessment was reduced to \$27,200.

The regulation of the Police Commission, reduced \$1,000 was presented and adopted in the budget.

An amended notice of injury was presented by attorneys for Mary C. O'Brien. This was referred to the village clerk and the law committee.

A communication from the Business Men's Association, which was presented to the trustees, was referred to the Sewer, Water & Street Commission. This matter has already been taken up by Commissioner W. H. Granger.

An invitation from Post Wheeler to participate in the Memorial Day celebration on Monday, May 21, was received and accepted.

The regulation of the Police Commission, reduced \$1,000 was presented and adopted in the budget.

Trustee Brunhagen, who was the claims made by Mary Grail, Edwin Closson, Mary Welch and Margaret Meehan for injuries sustained in the village, he rejected. The recommendation of the committee was approved and the claims rejected.

Trustees Callahan, Watson, Biss and Morrissey were absent from the meeting.

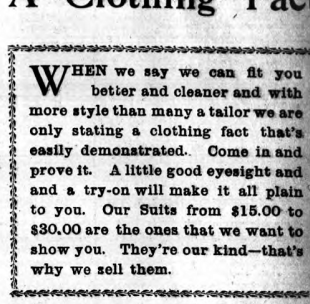
